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The **HAWAII DISABILITY RIGHTS CENTER (HDRC)** is a non-profit corporation established in Hawaii in 1977 to defend and enforce the human, civil and legal rights of people with disabilities through the provision of information and individual and systemic advocacy.

HDRC is the State of Hawaii's designated "P&A" - Protection and Advocacy System, and "CAP" - Client Assistance Program, for Hawaii's estimated 200,000 residents with disabilities. The HDRC mandates are established in Federal law, Hawaii State law, and by Executive Order.

Following an annual public comment process, HDRC client service priorities are selected from the issues outlined in this table. All **HDRC** activities are targeted to **protect the rights**, **advocate for the outcomes** and **achieve the goals** presented here.
